Units of Inquiry Update by Ms Indira

Our teachers and students have been busy with their unit learning and preparing for our first Student Led Conference since Covid. Through our unit learning, we have been exploring the essential elements of IB PYP, such as the IB Learner Profile Attributes and the Approaches to Learning (ATLs). From children under 2 up to kindergarten, students develop and enhance multiple lifelong skills within each unit. In the PYP, these skills are known as Approaches to Learning (ATLs), and they are:

- Thinking skills - we make sense of our learning and apply them daily.
- Self-management skills - we develop confidence in managing ourselves, our feelings, and our responsibilities.
- Communication skills - we find different ways to communicate and express our ideas, thoughts, and opinions.
- Social skills - we develop confidence in playing and learning with our peers.
- Research skills - we learn to find answers to our questions and questions from a variety of sources.



The Pre-Nursery level has been inquiring into the wonderful world of the Arts. Under the transdisciplinary theme of 'How We Express Ourselves', the students have been exploring different art forms. The focus is on creating and responding to the various art forms, from singing, dancing, and drama to painting. By the end of the unit, we hope children will be more open-minded and willing to try different activities.

The Nursery level has also been looking into the Arts, but this time from a cultural perspective. Under the transdisciplinary theme of 'How We Express Ourselves', nursery students have been inquiring into different forms of arts from various countries, such as Chinese cultural dance, and art techniques used in Aboriginal paintings. By the end of the unit, we hope children gain a greater appreciation and awareness of art from different cultures.



The LK/UK level has been inquiring into 'How We Organise Ourselves'. The level has been looking at currency and how it affects our lives. Students have set up shops in the dramatic-play area, where students can play customers and cashiers. Taking the lead from the interests of children, teachers plan meaningful learning engagements and help promote children's understanding of the unit.

For Under 2's programme, the focus has been on animals and insects. The teachers have set up the classroom with various animal provocations for students to explore. They have been exploring the common insects through sensory activities, stories, 'Show and Tell' and songs.

Lastly, we are excited to have our first Student Led Conference (SLC) in many years. During the SLC, parents will experience their child's learning in the classroom. Students can show their classroom and demonstrate their learning to their parents. See you there!

Face Mask Mandates
